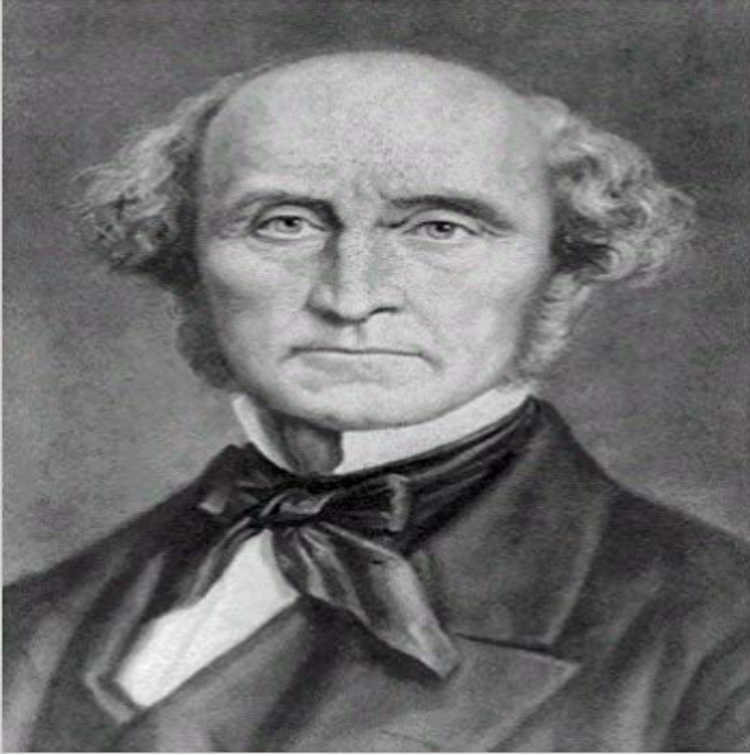


A Few Words on Non-Intervention (Illustrated)
